


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Albatross Class:

We have been busy with a range of activities this week - we spent some time exploring maps, both of the world and of smaller places. Some of us then made our own maps and we had maps of the Falklands as well as treasure maps for pirates. In maths, we have been working on our shape knowledge and we really enjoyed going on a 3D shape hunt around the classroom. We had to remember to find things that were solid that could be picked up so that it qualified as a 3D shape. We found out that cylinders were easy to find but pyramids were the trickiest! We also made our own 'character pots' ranging from gorillas to unicorns. We are now going to see if we can grow their 'hair' and we planted our own cress seeds on damp cotton wool. 
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Falcon Class:

This week has flown by and I can't believe that we are already at the end of week 4. The children are thoroughly enjoying their learning and have produced some wonderful discussions and thoughts throughout their history and RE lessons this week. In maths, Year 3 have completed their unit on fractions where they have been solving reasoning problems by finding non-unit fractions. Year 4 have been looking at identifying different types of angles and measuring them with a protractor. In English, they have built up a wonderful bank of phrases to be used in their setting description writing next week. Science this week, saw the children experimenting with which materials are magnetic and then investigating whether the magnetic force can act through different materials. They also investigated if the thickness of different materials affect the strength of the magnet.







Science & STEM Club:

Science Club this week had great fun making catapults and then firing different objects. Some children measured the distances that their objects travelled using metre rulers. *For next weeks science fun we will be making lava lamps so if possible, please bring a small empty water bottle with you.







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
Meadowlark Class:

Despite the miserable weather, Meadowlarks have remained chipper, working hard in all subjects and earning lots of team points.

Our history topic is focussed on the Victorian period with learning concentrating on: the conditions in which children worked in the factories, how the Industrial Revolution changed the financial landscape due to machinery and many inventions (which we still have today) and how the situation increased the fortunes of the rich, while the poor people stayed the same. There were some very poignant moments followed by thoughtful questions from Meadowlarks.

'The Hound of the Baskervilles' is proving to be of great interest to us all. The children are recognising how the beautiful historical vocabulary and phrases impact on the reader and are becoming more inspired by the figurative language of the author Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creating a poem to demonstrate this style of language.

Angles and coordinates have dominated our maths learning with some very good learning taking place - Meadowlarks are going at a pace - well done!

Further information on the School Governance Committee can be found below:

MOD School Governance Committees (SGCs) do not have the statutory responsibilities or full delegations held by a Governing Body in England. These responsibilities lie with HQ DCS (MOD Schools) acting as the Appropriate Authority.

The headteacher has operational and leadership responsibility for the school and should be first point of contact with matters regarding the school.

The school is supported by the SGC who assist:

- In the provision of a strategic view. E.g. the SGC contributes to the setting up
 and review of the School Improvement Plan (SIP) which is the school's operational
 framework focussing on raising standards of achievement, establishing high expectations and promoting effective teaching and learning
- Acting as critical friend. The SGC supports the head teacher and staff through provision of advice, guidance, information and constructive challenge;
- Ensuring accountability. The SGC holds the school to account on its performance and management. By asking questions at SGC meetings and by carrying out SGC visits supported by a member of school staff. These visits have agreed areas of focus linked to the SIP and will enable members of the SGC to ask further questions and to see an area from the SIP in action.
