Falcon Class:

In Falcons Class this week, we have been learning how to add and subtract amounts of money and calculate change. Year 4 have been learning about the different types of triangles and quadrilaterals. In English, we have started to write our setting description narratives, focussing on Anne Boleyn's journey from Hever Castle to the Tower of London. We have included some wonderful examples of personification, similes and descriptive writing.

In history we looked at the famous Armada painting of Queen Elizabeth I and discussed the symbolism, inferring what kind of a person she really might have been. In science we have carried out an investigation using Newton meters to see how much force was needed to pull an object across different surfaces.

Science & STEM Club:

This week, we made our own version of a lava lamp, using vegetable oil, water and food colouring. The children used the equipment to measure out what they needed before adding Alka Seltzer tablets to the mixture. They were fascinated to see the bubbles dancing and rising in the fluid. We then darkened the room and had a another go, watching the heat from the torches help the bubbles along and make them glow. If your lava lamp is not working as well as it should at home (they don't last for long) then add a little bit of salt and remove the lid. Then add another Alka Seltzer tablet and it should be rejuvenated.










