It has been a very busy month in Orca class since the last newsletter! We very much enjoyed our visit to Stanley, despite the wind! We had fun exploring the museum and completing a scavenger hunt and then we visited Memorial Wood and the Cross of Sacrifice to allow us time to research and reflect on our history topic of WW2 but also the conflict of 1982 here in the Falklands.




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Back in the classroom, our English focus was based upon the book 'The Journey'. This was about refugees travelling to escape war in their home country. We studied the book carefully and produced some very high quality work from diary entries to descriptive writing to finally our own narrative depicting such a journey.



In our topic work, we finished our History unit by finding out more about VE Day and learned reasons as to why Germany lost the war. We wrote our own newspaper articles all about the celebrations. This half term, our learning focus is a geography unit - we have started it by exploring mountains around the world and finding out how mountains are formed - we did our own investigation into this using towels to represent the colliding plates in the earth's crust. We enjoyed making our own miniature mountain ranges







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Lastly, it has been great to see some budding artists in the class. We all created our own 'illustration' to represent part of our narrative writing but, in addition to this, in our art lessons, there has been some wonderful effort! We worked hard on our sketching skills to produce WW2 style images as well as pieces inspired by the work of Lowry.
